WHY?

 people living with HIV (PLWH) in the U.S. Despite multiple evidence-based prevention strategies, there are still 50,000 new cases reported each year.

Of all PLWH in the U.S., 75% are not virally suppressed.2

The HIV care continuum is the model used by federal, state and local agencies to identify issues related to improving the delivery of care to people living with HIV in the United States. The continuum has 5 main steps: HIV diagnosis, linkage to care, staying in care, receiving combination antiretroviral therapy or cART, and viral suppression. We reversed the chart to demonstrate the urgency in increasing the rate of viral suppression – the final step of the care of continuum.



PLWH are not virally suppressed and are at greater risk of infecting others, and increasing their own morbidity and mortality.
