The purpose of this letter is to inform you of a new online resource to assist you in the provision of quality, evidence-informed HIV infection prevention and treatment healthcare services.

The AIDS Education and Training Center (AETC) Program National HIV Curriculum, developed with funding from the Health Resources and Services Administration (HRSA), HIV/AIDS Bureau, has been designed to keep you updated on state-of-the-science in HIV infection prevention and management. Comprised of six modules, each representing a different core competency identified as essential by HIV care experts, the curriculum was designed to provide novice-to-expert clinicians (primarily physicians, physician assistants (PAs), advanced practice nurses (APNs), and pharmacists) with updated information and national guideline recommendations for quality HIV infection prevention and treatment. The modules include: Screening and Diagnosis, Basic HIV Primary Care, Antiretroviral Therapy, Co-Occurring Conditions, Prevention of HIV, and Special Populations. This National HIV Curriculum also provides direct access to validated clinical screening tools and calculators to assist you in providing care to people living with HIV as well as those at risk of infection.
