

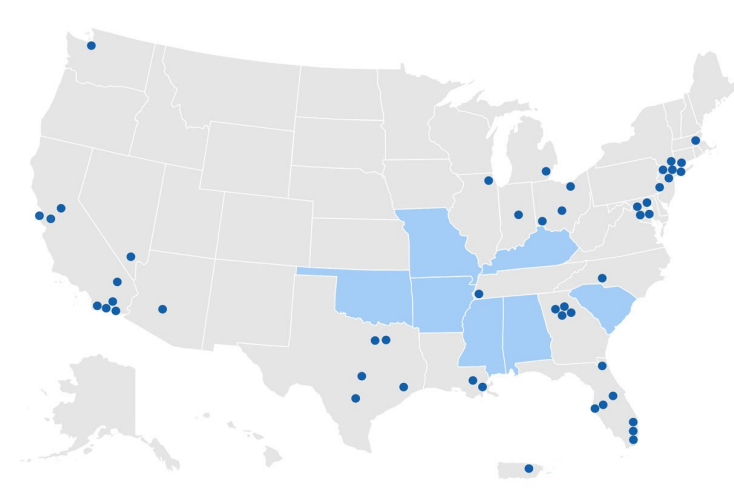
The Ryan White HIV/AIDS Program's (RWHAP) AETC Program is working to achieve the goals for

ENDING THE HIV EPIDEMIC: A Plan for America

The goal of Ending the HIV Epidemic: A Plan for America (EHE) is to reduce new HIV infections in the U.S. by 75% by 2025 and by 90% by 2030. The RWHAP's AETC Program, funded by the Health Resources and Services Administration's HIV/AIDS Bureau, is one of several programs awarded to tailor and implement strategies to build clinician capacity to address the plan's 4 key pillars:

- **1**
Diagnose all people with HIV as early as possible.
- **2**
Treat people with HIV rapidly and effectively to achieve sustained viral suppression.
- **3**
Prevent new HIV infections by using proven interventions, including pre- and post-exposure prophylaxis and syringe services programs.
- **4**
Respond quickly to potential HIV outbreaks to get needed prevention and treatment services to people who need them.

The EHE initiative is focusing on approximately 50 jurisdictions (cities, states, and counties) where new HIV infections are most concentrated. Each of the 8 AETC regions has at least one such jurisdiction.

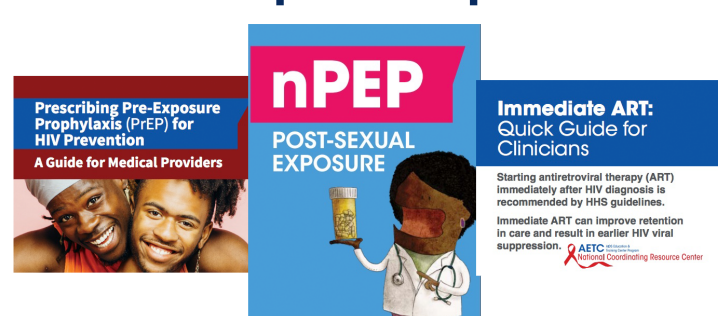
Promote AETC resources & successes
