


There's an estimated 1.2 million people living with HIV (PLWH) in the U.S.'

Veterans of the HIV care workforce are retiring, and more providers with HIV care education are needed to respond to the epidemic, 2,3

Of HIV care providers in the U.S., >50% are >50 years old



Specialized HIV care training increases the pool of practitioners capable of providing primary care to PLWH.



Nearly 70% of Ryan White facilities report difficulty recruiting HIV clinicians, citing a lack of providers as the leading cause

Cultural competence is associated with greater equity in care and better care outcomes of PLWH.

> **Advanced practice** nurses in HIV care are prepared to respond to related public health conditions that can impact the management of HIV care,5.6 like:






